

How did I come into doing this type of health coaching work?

A brief rundown of remarkable aspects of my story...

Prior to falling down the rabbit hole of chronic illness, I experienced:

significant turmoil as a result of family dysfunction life-threatening acute illnesses and accidents sexual molestation heavy antibiotic use toxic boyfriend relationships lack of self-care perfectionism continual overdoing and overachieving and the list goes on...

Once I did become chronically ill, the list of diagnoses ranged from:

"We have no clue what's wrong with you!" "There is nothing wrong with you, your labs look GREAT! CFS Fibro MCAS Chronic Lyme CIRS Interstitial Cystitis POTS Psychosomatic Disorder and the list goes on!

A massive (slow-growing) liver parasite went undiagnosed for nearly 14 years and culminated in radical liver resection surgery where 80% of my liver and my gallbladder had to be removed.

Many things went wrong after this surgery, including a massive infection and temporary liver failure. The recovery was BRUTAL, and I was left with nerve damage to my vagus nerve and small bowel.

Over the course of two decades, I did every "cutting-edge" treatment I could find and afford within conventional, integrative, and holistic arenas to the tune of hundreds of thousands of dollars – with little to no success.

Many times, the treatments made we worse.

Over the course of everything I just described, I endured many other traumatic experiences such as...

Medical PTSD Invalidation and gaslighting Workplace bullying and discrimination Husband's battle with alcoholism / marital distress Traumatic loss of loved-ones, including my first and only child Hardcore financial stress The loss of my career, friends, identity, etc. A victim mindset Serious clinical depression and suicidal ideation And more!

During my journey, there was little to no attention given to the concepts I'm going to discuss in this presentation.

In 2013 I suffered a massive breakdown that forced me to walk away from my teaching career to save my own life.

At this point, my husband and I no longer had the financial wherewithal (or energy) to continue exploring expensive treatments.

I realized I had 2 choices:

#1: To give up (which I did many times!)
#2: To become my own best healer




How do you define them?

Empowerment-Based



Trauma-Informed

Trauma-informed means having a solid, working understanding of the role trauma plays in creating chronic health and life issues – and having a large toolbox of knowledge, techniques, and strategies to pull from to best support your clients on this aspect of their healing journey – particularly nervous system self-regulation.



Resilience

Resilience is our ability (in body, mind, and spirit) to optimally respond to and overcome stressors placed upon us.

Resilience and nervous system regulation, particularly autonomic nervous system regulation, go hand in hand.

Our level of resilience is directly proportional to our ability to show up in our lives as the best version of ourselves.

Neural Rewiring

Neural rewiring is the process of rewriting the script that our nervous system follows, especially during times of stress.

This means pruning back neural pathways that don't serve us and replacing them with ones that support our wellness and personal success. This is essential because our neurology becomes our biology and vice versa.



Part III Food for Thought





The global toxic burden is increasing exponentially.

The more industrialized and technology-driven the world becomes, the more toxins we accumulate in our bodies, especially in the brain, the epicenter of the nervous system.

To date, hundreds of thousands of new chemicals and other toxins have been created by mankind, chemicals which do not exist in nature, particularly artificial blue light and dirty electricity.

Artificial blue light, dirty electricity, and constant stimulation coming from all the technology that we've all come to love and depend on is particularly toxic to our nervous systems.

We are natural beings governed by the laws of the natural universe.



The further we deviate from these laws, the further from health and closer to dis-ease we move.

In sum, peoples' nervous systems are being pushed beyond their capacities.

Food for Thought #2

Chronic physical and mental health challenges are on the rise and becoming increasingly complex and minimally or non-responsive to many interventional strategies.


The current medical paradigm is not designed to adequately support those with chronic health conditions.

Traditional functional approaches are also falling short in many ways **for some**.

More and more people are not achieving sustainable wellness with labs, diets, pathogen protocols, detoxes, etc.

Food for Thought #3

Chronic dis-ease is most often the result of a multitude of factors that converge into the "Perfect Storm" making a person a weak host.



Food for Thought #4

There are 2 types of chronic dis-ease



Type 1: Non-Complex

Largely driven by lifestyle and lack of self-care.

Responds well to lifestyle and biochemical-based interventions such as lab testing, pathogen eradication protocols, detoxes, etc.

Once they commit, the person has the wherewithal to implement and stick with necessary lifestyle shifts.

The healing path has some ups and downs but it's relatively straight forward and the person does recover and get on with life.

Type 2: Complex


Improvements from biochemical-based interventions such as lab testing, pathogen eradication protocols, detoxes, etc. **are short-lived or the person cannot tolerate them.**

The person lacks the wherewithal to implement and stick with necessary lifestyle shifts, they take it to perfectionist extremes, or toggle back and forth.

Despite a substantial investment of time, energy and finances in various interventions, the person remains stuck. This often goes on for years or even a lifetime.

This type of client is becoming more and more common! There is often a sense of powerlessness.

Depression and anxiety run rampant.

Food for Thought #5

Unresolved trauma and nervous system dysregulation are more a norm than an exception these days.

Many, perhaps most people lack the knowledge and tools to best support nervous system self-regulation and move beyond the footprints of trauma.

I also believe working with clients in this capacity (effectively) is a greatly lacking in many health restoration programs.

Part V

12 Things to Know About Trauma

As a reminder, unresolved trauma patterns get buried deep within our psyches (outside of our conscious awareness) and alter our...



#1: One does not need to be a war veteran or a victim of a disaster such as the World Trade Center attack of 2001 to succumb to the aftermath of trauma.

Trauma comes in all forms. It can be physical, biochemical, psychological, big, little, acute, ongoing, overt, covert, generational, global, etc.



#2: Trauma is defined as any experience that one perceives (consciously or unconsciously) to be life-threatening or overwhelming and/or where one feels powerless to flee, protect themselves, or change the circumstances.

#3: Interpersonal, covert trauma, such as betrayal, abuse, neglect, gaslighting, bullying, narcissism, etc., is often the most damaging and challenging to move beyond.

#4: When we feel powerless to change our circumstances, we often go into freeze mode. During this state, the energy of trauma gets trapped in the body, where it becomes "issues in our tissues" and patterns within our neurology.

#5: Recurring trauma sensitizes the system more and more. This causes a person to become less and less able to deal with new stressors that arise, and even the stimulation of daily life can be overwhelming.

#6: Unresolved trauma is dysregulating to our entire being. The inability to keep ourselves balanced leads to chaos and crisis in our health, wellbeing, and lives.

#7: Traumatic experiences "set" the nervous system to a state of stress maladaptation. In other words, the stressors placed upon the body, mind, and spirit exceed one's ability to adapt.

In this state, the nervous system and thus every other body system, particularly the digestive, endocrine, and immune systems, no longer interpret and respond to environmental inputs appropriately.

#8: Unresolved trauma is dysregulating to our entire being. The inability to keep ourselves balanced leads to chaos and crisis in our health, wellbeing, and lives.

#9: Because of its impact on our physiology and psychology, unresolved trauma is a significant player in the development of and inability to heal from chronic illness.

Unresolved trauma, particularly ACEs (adverse childhood events) and other covert traumas, is linked to many conditions such as chronic fatigue syndrome, fibromyalgia, autoimmunity mast cell syndromes, cancer, and more.

Influence of Psychological Stress on Chronic Fatigue Syndrome

Abstract: This article reviews the influence of psychological stress on chronic fatigue syndrome (CFS). Studies have demonstrated that psychological stress is involved in the CFS onset, exacerbation, and/or relapse, while early life stress acts as a risk factor toward the development of CFS in later life. CFS patients may have disrupted stress systems, including HPA axis hypofunction and ANS alterations characterized by sympathetic overactivity and low vagal tone. Individuals with CFS respond to psychological stress differently from healthy subjects in that CFS patients show a blunted (or similar) activation of the HPA axis and SNS and attenuation of proinflammatory cytokine induction, whereas psychological stress increases cytokine levels in healthy subjects. It is not fully understood how such disrupted stress systems and differential stress responsiveness contribute to the pathophysiology of CFS. Further studies are necessary to determine whether laboratory stress can fully replicate typical daily stress and how stress responsiveness is related to psychological stress in low-grade fever in CFS and the role of adaptive or maladaptive coping in the severity of CFS symptoms.

"We propose a model of PTSD linked to cyclical autonomic dysfunction, triggered and maintained by the laboratory model of kindling, and perpetuated by increasingly profound dorsal vagal tone and endorphinergic reward systems. These physiologic events in turn contribute to the clinical state of dissociation. The resulting autonomic dysregulation is presented as the substrate for a diverse group of chronic diseases of unknown origin."

#10: One of the most challenging aspects of trauma is that it often creates a vibrational resonance within us that draws us into or attracts situations to us that are the same or similar to the ones that caused the trauma in the first place.

In other words, we become a magnet to further chaos and trauma. We're inextricably drawn to people and circumstances that replicate the original trauma in both obvious and non-obvious ways.

Re-enactments/recreations of trauma are the universe's and our psyche's way of making us repeat lessons that we need to learn. They are forcing us to confront and deal with our unresolved trauma so we can finally heal and move on from deep mental and emotional wounds keeping us captive.

#11: Many people choose to become wellpreneurs because they've experienced health and life challenges themselves. Many become wounded healers.

Unresolved trauma often rears its head for wounded healers in the form of perfectionism, self-doubt, fear of putting oneself out there, business overwhelm, lack of boundaries, poor work-life balance, burnout syndrome, and more.

I speak from personal experience here, but the more I heal, the more I break free from these shackles.

#12: While healing physiological dysfunction is critical and cannot be skipped, all the best, most cutting-edge biochemical interventions such as lab tests, supplements, herbs, therapeutic diets, IV therapies, and other health hacks will have limited efficacy if unresolved trauma programs are running within the subconscious.

Subconscious trauma patterns continuously hijack the nervous system, create interference in the energy field, and fuel selfsabotage, limiting beliefs, and unsupportive mindsets.

Because of this, a trauma-informed practitioner/coach needs to look upstream of upstream...

I do, however, take a super deep dive into how to do this within my Wellness Code Practitioner Certification Training Program.

In the meantime, however, I can share with you my general **5-part framework** as well as some tips to get you started!



The Wellness Code 5-Step Framework!

Investigate, Identify & Remove as Many Stressors as Possible

Lifestyle Environmental Physiological Biomechanical Psychological Bio-energetic Etc.



A BIG part of Step #1 is working with clients in a way that fosters self-discovery, agency, taking 100% responsibility, and helping them become their own best healers.

There is much involved in this but here are 8 tips...

Tip #1: I build an empowerment-based, trauma-informed, and neural-rewiring approach into my overall approach starting with the marketing messaging and then in the initial consult through the duration of my coaching programs.

Tip #2: Self-Assessment of Root Cause Triggers of Chronic Dis-ease

Tip #7: I regularly check-in with my clients about the importance of addressing the 5 most important secondary & bidirectional physiological triggers of nervous system dysfunction:

- 1. Blood sugar dysregulation
- 2. Dehydration (water and minerals)
- 3. Lack of restorative sleep
- 4. Improper breathing patterns
- 5. Gut dysfunction (symptoms or not!)



Each of these are massive stressors and failure to dial in on each will result in continued nervous system dysregulation Tip #8: I also emphasize (regularly) with my clients that our nervous systems need ample breaks to recover from the following each day:


